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Maya Goldberg, MPH, MSN, NP has been an Adult Nurse Practitioner for the past 20 years. Maya joined the Global Disaster Response team in 2016 and has deployed 7 times to humanitarian disasters, 3 of which have been to the Mexican/US border to care for migrants.

Liliana Ramirez Gómez, MD is the Clinical Director of the Memory Disorders Division at MGH. Dr. Ramirez Gomez provides clinical service (evaluation, treatment recommendation, and ongoing medication treatment) to patients in the Memory Disorders Clinic. Dr. Ramirez Gomez completed medical school at the University of Antioquia in Medellin, Colombia, and neurology residency at the USC Keck School of Medicine, where she also served as Chief Resident. After residency, Dr. Ramirez Gomez completed a Cognitive and Behavioral Neurology fellowship at USC's Memory and Aging Center. Dr. Ramirez Gomez then served as Director of the Acute Neurology Unit at Rancho Los Amigos National Rehabilitation Center, Los Angeles. Before joining MGH, Dr. Ramirez Gomez worked as an Assistant Clinical Professor of Neurology at the University of California, San Francisco, in the outpatient general neurology clinic, where she provided direct service and supervised neurology residents in longitudinal clinics. Dr. Ramirez Gomez is fluent in English and Spanish. At MGH, Dr. Ramirez Gomez created a comprehensive neurology clinic focused on providing culturally sensitive care for Spanish-speaking patients. Dr. Ramirez Gomez is co-investigator at the Multicultural Alzheimer's Prevention Program (MAPP) and the Massachusetts Alzheimer's Disease Research Center (MADRC) at MGH. Her research goals are to identify preclinical biomarkers for Alzheimer's Disease (AD) and related dementias (AD/ADRD) and find ways to better assist underserved Spanish language people with dementia, including patients and their caregivers.

Anjala Tess, MD is a practicing hospitalist in the Division of General Medicine and Primary Care, Vice Chair for Quality in the Department of Medicine at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center (BIDMC), and an associate professor in medicine at Harvard Medical School. She completed both Rabkin and HMS Academy educational fellowships and has over 20 years of experience in teaching and developing educational programming in quality and safety. She developed a novel QI curriculum that has trained over 750 residents and fellows. She served as the Fellowship Director for the CRICO-based Harvard Fellowship in Patient Safety and Quality with graduates leading across the HMS ecosystem and beyond. She founded and directs the HMS Masters in Healthcare Quality and Safety with students from around the globe. Nationally she has been active in defining the evolving expectations of quality and safety education through guidelines and in collaboration with the National Patient Safety Foundation and the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education.
